By signing this Counseling Requirement Form, I understand that:

1. The student must submit the intent to participate form to Crestwood High School Guidance Office no later than 11:59 p.m. on or before April 1st.

2. The student must meet all deadlines outlined on the College Credit Plus Deadlines and Requirements document you were provided in this counseling session/meeting.

3. The student is eligible to take up to 30 college credit hours per year which can be taken in the summer, fall, or spring and may not exceed 120 college credits between grades 7-12. If a student is taking classes at both High School and college, there is an adjusted formula used to determine the 30 credit hour limit. The student must discuss this with their School Counselor.

4. Students are not permitted to take courses that are remedial, courses that do not count toward a college degree program, or religious courses that are not taught for historical purposes.

5. The student and/or guardians will be responsible for the cost of the college classes if the student fails a course or drops it after the 14th day after the class begins.

6. The local school district pays for books but the books must be returned in good condition to the school at the end of the semester.

7. The student/guardians are responsible for transportation to and from the college.

8. The student has the option to take classes at the college, online, or at Crestwood High School if the high school is offering CCP courses taught at the high school.

9. The student must be enrolled in **the equivalency** of 5 high school credits over the course of the school year to be both a full time student and to be eligible to play sports. I also understand that the student and/or parent will meet with his or her high school counselor to discuss if he or she is enrolled in enough credits for the year.

10. All college grades are final and will be official on both the high school transcript as well as the college transcript. The grade that is issued by the college is what is recorded on the high school transcript, including W (withdrew).

11. All college classes are weighted one point higher than regular and honors classes taken at the high school. For example a 1 credit A in a regular or honors class at the high school is worth 4 points, but a 1 credit CCP course (college course worth 3 or more college credits) is worth 5 points. GPA is determined by dividing the total number of points by the total number of credits. Points for classes that are worth less than 1 credit are divided accordingly (i.e an A in a ½ credit class is worth 2 points). See your high school counselor for a breakdown of point values.

12. The student is required to take the state end of course exam for English 9, English 10, Algebra I, and Geometry at the high school, even if the student is taking a course at the college to count for those classes. Their grade in the equivalent college course will also be converted to a score and the higher score will be counted toward graduation points. If the student is taking a college course to count for high school biology, government, or US history, the students does not have to take the state end of course exam and the grade from the course will convert to points toward the student's total state testing points.

13. The student and parent must attend the CCP meeting/counseling session and reapply to the college following the same process every year that the student participates in the CCP program.

14. There are both risks and rewards to participating in the CCP program. I have carefully listened and considered both aspects that have been addressed in this counseling session/meeting, I have sought out further clarification from my high school counselor regarding other concerns I may have, and I have made the decision that is ethically in the best interest of my/my child's developmental growth, academic pursuits, career goals, and personal interests.
