
Rotary Club Donates Dictionaries to C.I.S. Third Grade Students



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Superintendent's Letter . . . Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) About Security Measures & Alert Now Messages

Q: What general safety measures are in effect in Crestwood?

A: Our current safety measures are:

- All buildings now have locked doors and "buzz in systems."
- Authorized visitors are required to sign-in/out and wear visitor badges.
- There is extensive camera coverage throughout the district that can be monitored internally and by local police.
- There is a full-time student Resource Officer for the district who is a member of the Mantua Police Department.
- A SAFE SCHOOLS hot-line is in place for "anonymous tips" to be left related to safety or security concerns (1-800-4-1-VOICE ext.359).
- An internal safety committee meets monthly to discuss security matters and upgrades. The district safety committee consists of key administrators, the school resource officer, and two school board members
- Crestwood was one of the first districts in the area to fully train staff and students in the ALICE system of responding to potential intruders.

Q: What is a "Lockdown?"

A: Lockdowns are used when some kind of a security threat may be present or rumored and merits immediate investigation or implementation of non-standard security measures. Examples include bomb threats, an unauthorized visitor, an authorized visitor who exhibits inappropriate behavior, or even a threat in a nearby district or community that could conceivably impact student safety in Crestwood.

The type of lockdown varies based upon the specific matter at hand and what degree of restriction needs to be placed upon students and staff to maximize security and to enable more efficient investigation by district officials and usually law enforcement officers.

Board Engages Finding Leaders to Assist in Superintendent Search

In late December, the Board of Education met with Finding Leaders and OSBA (Ohio School Boards Association) and heard presentations from them regarding how they handle the search. The Board ultimately voted to hire Finding Leaders. This is the same company that assisted with the Treasurer's search last year.

The Board of Education met with Finding Leaders at the beginning of January to go over the initial steps to begin the search. The position has been advertised regionally and the application deadline is March 8.

Focus groups of staff and community members will be conducted in January and February in order to help Finding Leaders match candidates with district needs. Interviews will be conducted in April with hopes for an appointment in May. **Q:** During lockdown I may receive a text message from my child before an "Alert Now" phone message issued by the district. Why is that?

A: When a building goes into lockdown the first priority is to make sure that all students are safe and that the matter of concern is being dealt with quickly, safely, and efficiently. Having lead administrators

stop to send a message would interrupt dealing with the matter at hand. Also, since texting and Facebook are types of immediate messaging, it is virtually impossible for the district to get a message out before texts are sent.

Q: Students are not always told why a lockdown is occurring. Why?

A: Some details must be confidential so as to not impede an investigation, compromise an investigation, or interfere with actions of law enforcement personnel.

Q: Why have students been sent home without their books or personal belongings during a bomb threat?

A: We realize this is inconvenient but safety is the first priority. Until the entire building is cleared by the police, we cannot allow students, parents, or employees to enter any part of the building. Students will not be penalized academically or otherwise if they are not able to get their work since extended time will be provided to turn in assignments.

Q: Who makes the decision as to when or whether a building should be evacuated or not?

A: This is a collaborative decision between law enforcement and district and building administration.

Q: After a situation is resolved why are specific details not provided?

A: Too much detail can compromise an investigation or contribute to potential future concerns.

Q: Can "Alert Now" phone messages be broadcast sooner? **A:** The timing of Alert Now varies based upon various factors that affect a given situation. The first priority is to make sure that students and staff are safe. The second is to deal with the actual situation in a timely manner. When these priorities are completed the message must be crafted carefully to make sure that it is accurate and clear to the parent or student who

Emergency School Closing Procedures and Notification

With winter weather having arrived, the possibility closings school is of upon us. Closings due to inclement weather or other emergencies are broadcast all local radio and on television stations. We ask that parents avoid calling the schools or stations since incoming calls tie up phones and delay notification.

Decisions on whether or not to close schools due to snow or extreme cold are often difficult since forecasts about if and when bad weather will arrive are often inaccurate. Periodically, forecasts are definitive enough that school can be called off in time for the nightly news. Most of the time, however, the decision is based on reports from district supervisors who are assigned the task of driving our roads between 4 and 5 a.m. on the days that bad weather is forecast. We attempt to contact all TV stations as early as we can so that parents can get the information they need in a

timely manner.

In addition to snow, windchill factors can also be а determining factor. А wind chill of more than 15 degrees below zero brings consideration for closing school due to the large number of students that wait outdoors for buses in our district. Safety is our greatest concern. The most difficult situation is when bad weather arrives immediately after the decision is made to keep schools open. In such cases, we respect the right of parents to make their own decisions based on neighborhood road and weather conditions.

If it becomes necessary to make up school days, the school calendar may be amended using days at the end of the school year.

An additional tool called Alert Now may also be used to contact parents who are part of that system. If you did not sign-up for the Alert Now system please contact your child's principal for details.

Flu Information for Parents



Flu season is upon us. Here are some suggestions to keep you and your child from getting sick this flu season:

Flu Prevention

1. Vaccination. Everyone over the age of six months should get a flu vaccination every year. The vaccine

may be a nose spray or shot. It's not too late to get a flu vaccine this school year.

2. Wash your hands. Hands should be washed frequently with soap and water or an alcohol hand rub.

3. Cover your cough and sneeze. Everyone should cough or sneeze into a tissue or their sleeve. The tissue should be thrown away immediately and hands washed.

4. Good health habits. Getting enough sleep, exercising, eating a healthy diet, drinking plenty of fluids and avoiding stress and people who are sick will help keep you and your family well this flu season.

What if you have the flu?

Flu can cause mild to severe illness, and at times can lead to death. People who have the flu often feel some or all of these symptoms:

- · Fever or feeling feverish/chills
- Cough
- Sore throat
- Runny or stuffy nose
- Muscle or body aches
- Headaches
- Fatigue (tiredness)

 Some people may have vomiting and diarrhea, though this is more common in children than adults.

If you or your child has these symptoms, you should stay home from work, child care or school until fever free (without the use of fever-reducing medication) for 24 hours. Children 18 years of age or younger should never be given aspirin when they have flu symptoms due to the risk of Reye's Syndrome. Use one of the other fever/pain reducing medications such as acetaminophen or ibuprofen instead.

If your healthcare provider prescribes an anti-viral

medication for you, take it as prescribed until it is all gone.

Have you ever wondered what it's like to be on TV? Students in Mr. Marfv's Studio Production class don't. They actually do it every day. Students in Mr. Marfy's classes produce 3-5 minute morning а announcements show every day, which is then broadcast to the students at the high school. In addition to their daily duties, students are encouraged to keep up with current events and then produce a full 30 minute news broadcast as part of their midterm and final exams, where they apply all the skills and knowledge they have acquired in the course.

"It's a great class because students are challenged problems to solve and sometimes overcome technical difficulties," Mr. Marfy said. "The goal is that they learn and become passionate about what they do in class, so that maybe they develop an interest in pursuing broadcasting as a career."



Mr. Marfy has a number of former students working in radio, film and television, the most notable of whom is 2001 graduate Nicole Pesecky, an anchor and reporter at WKMG-6 in Orlando.

As seventh grader Avrie Talboo explained as she checked out her new book, Miss Peregrine's Home for Peculiar Children by Ransom Riggs, "Brent made it sound interesting the way he explained the book. He described how he felt when he read the book."


Primary School Participated in One Book - One School Project
