Crestwood Analyzes Cost Reduction Options Community Information Meeting to be Held October 15

Parents, residents, staff are strongly encouraged attend community informational meeting scheduled for Monday, October 15 at 7 p.m. at Crestwood High School to discuss the financial status of the district and the impact of levy success or failure in the November election.

In 2011, Crestwood was rated "excellent" and was one of only two districts in Portage County to meet all 26 standards on the state report card despite having the lowest local operating millage in the county. Based on recently released data, it appears the district will again meet all 26 standards on the new 2012 report card.

Crestwood's students have excelled on academic measures, but all programs

and services are now under scrutiny for reductions if the levy is unsuccessful. Due to cuts of approximately \$1.8 million in state funds, Crestwood must acquire additional revenue or cut programs, services, and staff in order to maintain a balanced budget in 2013-2014.

Many cost reduction measures are already in place including reducing personnel expenditures by about \$1.1 million since last year by eliminating 5.5 teaching positions, 1 administrative position, 2 classified positions, and by replacing several retiring staff with lower- paid new employees. Additionally, employees have done their part by accepting wage freezes this year.

Despite these costcontainment efforts, a deficit at least \$1

projected for 2013-2014. At the 4.7 mill operating levy. the September 15 special meeting of the Board, potential cuts and fee increases were discussed as options to reduce approximately \$1 million dollars if voters do not approve

While not definitive, the chart below reflects discussion of how this could be achieved and includes estimates of amounts likely to be saved if changes are made in these areas.



High School Receives Gift of Electronic Sign


Crestwood High School students and staff were greeted this school year by a new digital sign in front of the high school building. The sign is comprised of two sections: a 24" x 94" double-sided illuminated cabinet bearing the text 'Crestwood High School', and a 48" x 94" LED display that supports animations, text and student digital artwork.

Dave McMahon, district technology coordinator, said a donor approached the district and wanted to donate the funds necessary to replace the existing sign on school property facing Route 44 with a digital sign. The donor had seen similar signs in front of other nearby high schools, McMahon said. He added that the old sign was failing with electrical problems and a cracked frame. Functionally, the sign required an individual

to walk to it to post information on it; an event that often times was not possible in inclement weather. It needed to be replaced, but it was not within the district's budget, he said.

"The new sign significantly increases our ability to effectively communicate with our community," said McMahon. "It's a visual statement to the community that reinforces all the great things that happen in our district."

The cost of the sign was approximately \$20,000, all donated, and fit into the existing brick structure of the old sign. The district incurred approximately \$3,800 in costs associated with the hardware required to wirelessly connect to the sign from the high school building. It is this connectivity that is utilized to post/edit information displayed on the



sign. Additionally, several staff members have been trained on how to create presentations to post to the sign.

The students and staff of Crestwood High School are extremely grateful for the generosity of our donor, and look forward to many years of use of this tool which showcases the efforts and achievements of our students.

District Partners with Mantua Police to Hire Student Resource Officer

In an effort to keep student safety paramount, Crestwood Local Schools plans to hire a student resource officer (SRO) to work in both the High School and Middle School. The district is working with the Mantua Police Department to hire and maintain an officer within the schools.

"After events of the past year including the tragedy at Chardon, incidents at colleges, and the increased availability of opiates to young people, we think it is prudent to do everything we can to keep our students safe," said Joe lacano, Crestwood

Superintendent.

SRO's responsibilities in schools are threefold. They act as a law enforcement officer, crime prevention specialist and educator. The primary purpose is to maintain peace in the school to ensure a safe learning environment. Secondly, they investigate. report and act on offenses that occur on school property or during school events. Lastly, they provide law-related education by sharing their expertise in the classroom on topics such as date rape. vandalism, theft prevention and patterns of victimization.

According to the Ohio School Resource Officers Association, "SROs are a positive role model for students who are not exposed to such role models in today's society. Their presence in the schools sends a strong message that violence is not acceptable."

Crestwood's plan is to work with the SRO to prevent crime in schools by having the officer present to patrol property, arrange police canine drug sweeps, and advise administrators and staff on security and safety issues.

High School Science Offers Hands-On Learning Experiences

The high school science department is back in full swing this year. The teachers are working to create meaningful projects that make the students active learners in their science courses. Below is a summary what the students at Crestwood High School have offered to them this year and the exciting lessons that they will complete.

Physical Science

Ninth grade students who are in Physical Science will learn about chemistry and how it relates to the students' daily lives and physics. Students will have an opportunity to design roller coasters, build a paper race car, construct an egg drop container, and many other exciting projects. The knowledge gained in this course will prepare the students for the Ohio Graduation Test.

Biology I

Biology I is offered to ninth and tenth grade students. This first-year biology class offers an exciting look at life while fulfilling the biological science requirement for graduation and preparing students for the Ohio Graduation Test. Students will learn about DNA extraction. and about the diversity and

classification of plants, animals and the other organisms. The year is concluded with the dissection of a Spiny Dogfish and a rat.

Human Biology

Human Biology is offered to students in tenth through twelfth grade who may be interested in pursuing a degree in the field of medicine. It is designed to be a basic science course in which students will gain a practical understanding of the human body and its functions. Along the way, students learn how to design a therapeutic exercise program take blood pressure readings. After the students learn about the anatomical structures of the different systems of the human body and build an understanding of the physiology of how the systems work together, they have the opportunity to dissect a Fetal Pig.

Environmental Science

This year in Environmental Science we will continue with many projects that we have started in the past. Some of these projects include monitoring both the biological chemical components the Cuyahoga River, monitoring the change in the human population of our school district, as well as

> dilemmas that face the world today. In addition to these projects we will be beginning a new partnership with MetroParks serving

Summit County by participating in a citizen science initiative. Using the program iNaturalist, we will be submitting data on various species of animals, plants, and fungi to their database. This will help the parks to monitor populations of these organisms and also create better programs to serve those populations.

Anatomy and Physiology

Anatomy and Physiology will be back at it again this fall preparing students who wish to enter the medical field. The coursework will allow the students to obtain experience that will put them in a position to be very successful in college. Topics that will be addressed will be the Endocrine System. Skeletal System, and the Muscular System. Students will also be studying and learning to identify different types of tissues. All of this will be done through the use of some of the more sophisticated electronic equipment available to students at the high school level, such as EMG's and digital microscopes.

General Physics

In General Physics, students will be exploring the world around them with a variety technologies. Students will use Vernier probeware to investigate forces, motion, electricity and magnetism. Students will also have the opportunity to use iPod touches to record live data (for example: kicking a football) and then use laptops and computer software to analyze their data and calculate the forces, velocity,

and acceleration.

AP Physics

In AP Physics, students will build upon their knowledge from general physics to prepare for the AP test at the end of the year as well as preparing for college. AP physics students will continue and expand their investigations, performing experiments to test static and kinetic friction, magnetic forces and fields, and wave interference using a laser.

Chemistry is always a "blast!" Though we won't actually be exploding things, we will spend a fair amount of time in the lab exploring the many concepts and phenomena that we will study this year. Students will learn how chemistry relates to topics in their everyday worlds, such as global warming, acid rain, fuel sources, and many others. They will also learn how to prepare and conduct lab experiments, and how to keep good lab notebooks to document the collection and analysis of their data. This course will not only provide them with a better understanding of chemistry in their daily lives, but prepare them for science courses that they may take in college.

In all science classes the students will be active and busy throughout the year no matter what course they are currently taking. Be sure to ask students who you know about all of the amazing programs activities offered Crestwood High School.

AP Courses Help Students Succeed in College Endeavors

Nine members of the Crestwood High School Class of 2012 earned Advanced Placement Scholar awards for demonstrating college-level achievement on multiple AP tests. Those who scored "3" or higher

Earning the AP Scholar with Honor award were John Franks, Josh Parr and Andy Soltisz, who posted an average score of at least "3.25" on all AP exams taken and "3" or higher on four or more of these exams. One student, Jocelyn Pearce, the Class of 2012 salutatorian, earned the AP Scholar with Distinction award for receiving an average score of at least "3.5" on all AP exams taken and scores of "3" or higher on five or more of these exams.

Nearly two million high school students took more than 3.7 million total AP exams at 18,000 high schools throughout the country in 2012. Most of these AP students took just one exam. For a school of Crestwood's size to boast so many scholars is quite an achievement.

According to research published by the College Board, the AP governing body, students who earn a "3" or higher on just one AP exam experience greater academic success in college and are more likely to graduate from college in four years than students with no AP background at all. Additionally, taking AP classes improves students' chances of earning scholarships and entrance into selective

colleges.

Andy Soltisz, for example, received a presidential scholarship from The University of Akron and his AP work earned him 23 college credits. But more importantly, Soltisz, a chemical

engineering major. says the increased workload and challenging material of AP classes made his transition to college courses "a breeze." In fact, he says. "l've noticed that a lot of people I live

and go to class with weren't prepared for the amount of studying and homework time that college courses would require. This being said, as a learner, I feel calm, prepared, and ready for the copious amounts of work that college is throwing at me. But when I look around, most people are stressed and cannot handle the transition from carefree learning [of high school] to active and responsible learning."

Karlie Lieberth concurs, saving that AP classes "helped me learn how to manage my time which is a big part of college." As a result of the increased work load of AP classes in high school, Lieberth says, "I have yet to feel overwhelmed by [college] work." She also says, "I feel that I am better prepared than a lot of my classmates. I always have all of my work done by the next class [and] I take better notes than a lot of my peers." Lieberth earned admission to the Honors College and scholarships amounting to full tuition. She intends to major in education.

Allison Hurd reports, "I have already had to write three papers for classes, and the writing skills I have gained [in AP classes] made it so much easier to write them. I already have some friends asking me to check their papers

for them to catch wording errors and to help them set up quotes." At Otterbein, Hurd, a political science major, has earned the Presidential scholarship—the highest academic scholarship awarded there.

When reflecting on her decision to take so many AP classes, Jocelyn Pearce says, "every AP class that I took has helped me prepare for college. There wasn't a big transition, where I felt out of place [in college] or said to myself 'wow, college is much harder than I expected'." And although she earned a presidential scholarship and placement into Otterbein's honors program, Pearce says, "The college credit I received from [earning high marks on] all the AP tests really helps. but I think the lessons I learned from the classes are what helps the most. I learned proper time management, study skills, good work ethic, etc., all from my AP classes."

Pearce, who intends to pursue a degree in actuarial science, believes the many skills and lessons she obtained from AP classes have helped her "feel leaps and bounds ahead of the other students [in her honors colloquium class]." In fact, she says all the writing assignments she's faced thus far have "come very easily" and she notes that while reading The Glass Castle for an honors class called Tales of Dangerous Youth, "I had every discussion point highlighted before [my professor] even told us what they were. I became such a better reader and writer [because of AP classes]."

As a parent whose three children all took various AP classes at Crestwood High School, Cindy Pearce says, "I firmly believe that my children have benefited from their AP classes at Crestwood." speaking of her daughter's decision to take AP classes her senior year rather than enroll in Post Secondary classes, Mrs. Pearce says, "Spending her senior year at Crestwood was perfect for Jocelyn. She had numerous fellow seniors tell her that they couldn't believe she was taking the AP classes. They admitted taking PSEO because they knew they were easier than her AP classes."

AP Social Studies Classes Visit DC

AP US History and AP Government classes are headed to Washington, D.C. this November for a tour of the nation's capital. This is the fourth consecutive year that teachers Angus McDougall and Candice Chupek have offered an overnight trip to their AP students. They started the annual trek in 2009 with a trip to D.C. That was followed by excursions to Philadelphia and then Williamsburg/Jamestown, Virginia.

"We cycle through the trips so that students who take APUSH their junior year can go on a different trip when they take AP Government, usually in their senior year," said Chupek. Each trip has been extremely successful and exciting.

"It is a treat for us as much as for students because we get to experience so many things for ourselves but also watch our students discover these amazing landmarks too" said McDougall. Both teachers feel this trip is an appropriate privilege for those students who commit to the rigors of AP courses as well for what they will gain from the actual experience. The group uses Discovery Tours as they provide master guides that cater to higher-level students and their interests. This year's trip will include an exclusive private tour of the Capitol Building arranged by the office of U.S. Representative Steven LaTourette.

Crestwood Schools Meeting Federal Nutrition Standards

Vennifer Bujak-Hirsch, S.N.S., Director of Nutrition Services

This fall, Crestwood school cafeterias are meeting tough new federal nutrition standards for school meals, ensuring that meals are healthy and wellbalanced and provide students all the nutrition they need to succeed at school. Now is a great time to encourage your kids to choose school lunch! School meals offer students milk, fruits and vegetables, proteins and grains, and they must meet strict limits on saturated fat, portion sizes and calories. The nutrition service department has been very proactive in implementing these changes gradually so that students will not see a major difference.

Starting in School Year 2012-2013, the changes required by law are:

- Flavored milk must be fat free, plain milk must be 1% or less. (Crestwood offers all flavors of milk fat-free)
- Students are required to take a fruit or vegetable with every meal and portion sizes of fruits and vegetables have been increased. (Crestwood offers a variety of fruit and vegetables daily to offer our students more choices)

- At least half of the grains offered must be whole grain-(At Crestwood almost all of our offerings are whole grain)
- Vegetables must be offered from the following subgroups on a weekly basis: Dark green, orange/red, starchy, bean/legume and other vegetables such as celery, green beans, green peppers and cauliflower.
- Age-appropriate calorie limits
 - · Less sodium

We're always working to offer Crestwood students healthier and tastier choices. We continue to work with our local vendors as well as provide opportunities to connect the cafeteria as an extension of the curriculum to teach students a life time habit of health and nutrition!

A Note From the Nurse

The beginning of the school year is always a busy time for everyone. One of the things the nurses have been doing is reviewing any health concerns you may have indicated on

your child's Field Trip and Emergency Medical Authorization form. In order for your child to stay safe and healthy at school we are asking that you let the nurse know if your child has any of the following:

- food or insect sting allergy that needs treatment with an antihistamine (benadryl) or an epipen
 - · asthma that is treated with an inhaler
 - diabetes
 - · seizures
 - high risk for injury/illness due to a specific medical condition (example: blood or bone disorder)

Ohio law requires school districts to have a healthcare plan for students with life threatening food allergies. If this applies to your child, please have your healthcare provider complete a food allergy treatment plan.

Many people have mild local reactions to bee/insect stings but if your child requires an antihistamine or an epi pen, the appropriate authorizations must be on file at school.

Children who need an inhaler for asthma flare-ups may keep an inhaler in the clinic but are also permitted by law to carry and self-administer their inhaler. In either case, an authorization completed by the healthcare provider and signed by them and the parent must be on file and renewed each school year. Children who use their inhaler in school and do not get the expected relief should come to the clinic for evaluation.

Medication administration forms and healthcare forms for asthma, bee/insect sting or food allergy, are available in the main offices. The healthcare provider must complete authorization for all prescription medication and the form must be signed by them and the parent/guardian. All over the counter medicine requires an authorization completed and signed by the parent/guardian. If you request a dose of medicine higher than recommended on the medication label, we also need a physician authorization to give it.

STUDENTS MAY NOT CARRY ANY KIND OF MEDICINE IN SCHOOL OR ON THE BUS.

Emergency inhalers and epipens are the only exception and they must have a physician permission form to carry them. Medication must be delivered to school by the parent/guardian or an adult they designate.

Students Practice Measurement While Creating Art



The seventh and eighth grade art projects on display near the middle school office are as different as can be. Learning to measure was the driving force behind the boxes created by the seventh graders. Measuring with a ruler is always a challenge and a task that needs to be taught. Seventh grade ruler practice was followed by decisions about box size. 


