Crestwood Board of Education Adopts Five-Year Forecast
At a special meeting on October 18, the Crestwood Board of Education adopted the five year forecast prepared by Treasurer/ CFO Carol Corbett for years 2012 through 2016. Districts are required by the state to submit a 5-year forecast at least twice per year, one by Oct. 31 and another between April 1 to May 31.

In her explanation of the five-year forecast, Corbett presented information in regards to how decreased state funding and an uncertain economy will impact the district throughout the next five years.
Revenues:
Overall state revenues continue to be lower than expected and this condition may result in further decreases in state funding for schools. This shortfall in state revenues has been projected to be within a wide range of overall reductions to state foundation revenues. The Crestwood administration and Board of Education is mindful of the state's financial condition and continues to monitor the situation with help from the many professional organizations that support school personnel.

Tax year 2009 was the update of property valuations for Portage County, which happens every three years and would traditionally result in an increase for 2012 real estate collections. However, due to the current depressed economic conditions in Ohio, a 5\% decrease in assessed valuations for residential property was made by the County Auditor for 2009.

Crestwood is currently collecting taxes at slightly over the state minimum of 20 mills, which represents the lowest collected millage for all school districts in Portage County. For 2012, the county estimates for revenues are relatively level. This adjustment in valuations has resulted in the district collecting slightly more than 20 mills for 2012. This forecast is prepared with level total funding in real estate collections for 2013 to 2016.

The biennium budget enacted for fiscal years 2010 and 2011 included approximately $\$ 740,000$ and $\$ 1,500,000$ per year in 2010 and 2011, respectively, from federal stimulus funds. At this time, no provision has been enacted into law to replace that source of funding beyond 2011. The loss of this revenue will not be replaced in years 2012 through 2016 - a decrease of approximately \$1,500,000 in annual revenue from 2011.

Antarctica project, Nature Detective Photo Challenge, and other exciting activities taking place in our schools.

The website will also showcase the use of a cutting edge technology called Gigapan. This is a robotic camera (used by both NASA and Google) that takes a patchwork of images, meshes them together, and creates a highly interactive panoramic image for viewers to explore. Ten teachers district-wide received training in October on how to use this technology to enhance student learning. Miss Harr is excited to take Gigapan with her to Antarctica so students can take virtual tours of Palmer Station and its extreme environment.

In recent weeks I have had the pleasure of meeting with members of our Parent Teacher Organizations (PTOs) to review details regarding Crestwood's achievement of the "Excellent" rating on the 2011 Local Report Card as designated by the Ohio Department of Education. As I'm sure you can imagine, it's wonderful to present such good news. In these presentations, I highlighted key information:


- Crestwood and Aurora were the only two districts in Portage County to meet all 26 standards;

Our financial decisions have allowed us to maintain quality services for students, meeting the needs of every child every day, while maintaining a fiscal responsibility to our community. Our diligence continues to pay off as we face this challenging economic climate that is forcing a decline in state contributions and reducing our overall budget. The National Science Foundation has funded his travels to Antarctica for several years to learn how this insect survives the cold harsh Antarctic environment. Potentially, the team's research may help doctors preserve human transplant organs for longer periods of time. Harr has been working with teachers across the district to connect student learning to this once in a lifetime opportunity for Crestwood.

## NOTE from the NURSES

Protect You and Your Child(ren) from Influenza, the Flu
The Flu season is fast approaching and many Crestwood employees took advantage of our district wellness day to get vaccinated against this potentially serious virus. The Center for Disease Control advises that by getting the flu vaccine you can protect yourself from Influenza and thus avoid spreading it to others. In this way we help prevent unnecessary illness and missed school days for our staff and students.

Influenza is a contagious disease caused by the influenza virus, which is spread by coughing, sneezing, or nasal secretions. Anyone can get influenza, but rates of infection are highest among children. Symptoms can include:

fever/chills • sore throat • muscle aches • fatigue • cough • headache • runny or stuffy nose<br>sometimes vomiting and diarrhea

Other illnesses can have the same symptoms and are often mistaken for Influenza but Influenza can cause high fever and pneumonia, and make existing medical conditions worse. It can cause seizures in children. It can be especially dangerous for young children and children of any age who have long term health conditions, including diabetes, asthma (even mild or controlled), heart, lung or kidney disease, or a weakened immune system. Each year thousands of people die from influenza and even more require hospitalization.

Yearly flu shots are recommended because Influenza viruses are always changing. A new flu vaccine is made each year to protect against the three flu viruses that research indicates are most likely to cause illness during the next flu season. Flu vaccine will not prevent disease from other viruses, including "stomach viruses" and other flu viruses not contained in the vaccine.

Other ways to help prevent the spread of flu and other germs:

- Cover coughs and sneezes.
- Wash hands often with soap and water or use an alcohol-based hand rub.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth. Germs spread this way.



## What if my child seems very sick?

Call for emergency care or take your child to a doctor right away if your child of any age has any of these warning or emergency signs: fast breathing or trouble breathing; bluish or gray skin color; not drinking enough fluids/ not urinating enough; severe, persistent vomiting; not waking up/not interacting; flu-like symptoms improve but then return with fever and worse cough; a child with chronic illness (like heart or lung disease, diabetes, or asthma) who develops flu symptoms. When can my child return to school?

If your child has flu-like symptoms, consult your doctor and make sure your child gets plenty of rest and drinks enough fluids. A child with a fever (temperature greater than 100 degrees) should stay home from school for at least 24 hours after their fever is gone without the use of a fever-reducing medicine. Consult your healthcare provider if you have questions about the flu shot or the best treatment for your child.

## If you build it ... Creating Meaning with Algebra

When are we ever going to use variables? Students in Mr. Judd's and Mr. Wesley's algebra classes will no longer need to wonder that thanks to the Skeleton Tower problem. In this investigation, students started solving a problem using arithmetic to count the number of cubes needed to build a tower, progressed to exploring the patterns involved with varying tower heights, and finally expressed the number of cubes needed for a tower of any height algebraically.

This showed the usefulness in being able to problem solve situations where concrete arithmetic is no longer practical! Our activity strongly reinforced many $8^{\text {th }}$ grade OAA indicators and incorporated graphing calculator technology as well.
